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1. A Word from the Chair

2. Hertford Museum Aims

3. Exhibitions

3.1 River Town

12th February – 12th June 2022

This popular exhibition looked at how Hertford's unique position at the confluence of four rivers has shaped its growth and development and at how people have lived, worked and played by the riverside, illustrated with a wealth of objects from our social history, archaeology, fine art and natural history collections.

3.2 The Friends of Hertford Museum: 40 years of Support 19th April – 12th June 2022

We celebrated the 40th anniversary of the Friends of Hertford Museum, working with their committee to create an exhibition charting the story of the Friends and the support they have given the museum.

3.3 Panshanger

24th May – 14th August 2022

Our visitors discovered the history of one of Hertford's best loved parks with this guest exhibition from the Friends of Panshanger Park, supported by our team here.

The FOPP also worked with children from Hertford St Andrew CofE School to create collages inspired by the park.



3.4 Where Once We Stood: Hertford's Lost Buildings 25th June – 27th November 2022

The exhibition opened with our first post covid preview, attended by the Marquess of Salisbury. It highlighted some iconic and less familiar buildings represented by our social history and archaeological collections, from the Union Workhouse to the Cold Bath Inn.

We asked visitors about their favourite lost building, with the much loved Hertford County Cinema coming in top.

3.5 The View from the Infirmary: Watercolours of Dr George Towers 23rd August – 13th November 2022

3.6 Hertford is my Home: Phase II

16th November 2022 – 26th March 2023

Funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund the physical exhibition strand of phase two of this project, recording and celebrating the arrival and contribution of people who have made their home in Hertford, took

place in the museum foyer display area. This phase included contributors hailing from Zimbabwe, Ukraine, Ireland, Norway and East London.

We joined museums across Europe in delivering an exciting evening event. Live performances from Nuala (Spanish), Oscar Tavares (Portuguese) and a collective of Hertford musicians (aged 15 - 60) tackling French sixties beat pop, delighted our 92 visitors.

Saturday 28th May 2022

140 visitors made bunting, tasted 1950s nibbles, enjoyed images of Hertford in the 50s, handled our reminiscence resources and watched two live performances of rock and roll music from The Goldbacks. The event was free, with £100 Jubilee funding support from East Herts District Council.

Those having pre booked for the sold out tour all attended, however, the open day was very quiet due to the situation.

4.12 Half Term Activities: Marvellous Mosaics

25th - 27th October 2022

55 children took part in the craft activities inspired by mosaic artists.

4.13 Takeover Day

10th November 2022

We worked with every child at Hertford St Andrews School for this event. Prior to the day itself our learning officer Vicky enabled key stage two children to devise a wellbeing trail around the museum. On the day itself, the KS2 children guided the KS3 through the trail. The children's work now forms a wellbeing trail leaflet for visitors of all ages.



4.14 You're the Voice: Superstar Karaoke

Saturday 12th November 2022

20 people attended the event and enjoyed the sparkly atmosphere of the Andrews Room, transformed for the night into an intimate nightclub. Those attending gave positive feedback and requested further karaoke nights.



4.15 Christmas Extravaganza 25th November 2022

91 children met Father Christmas in our grotto, with 345 people visiting on the night to enjoy the free crafts and the return of St Andrew's Church choir.

4.16 Christmas Crafts 22nd December 2022

37 children took part on the day making sparkly creations.



4.17 In Their Own Words: Oral History Workshop Saturday 21st January 2023

This free training session was funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund as part of our Hertford is My Home project. The participants, half of whom had travelled from across the county, learned how to record and manage oral histories, with unanimous positive feedback:

4.19 Hertford Is My Home Day Saturday 11th February 2023

A celebration of our National Lottery Heritage Funded project, the day was a huge success with eight

performances of live music representing the former homes of our exhibition contributors. Performers included The Welwyn Garden City Male Voice Choir, the Ukrainian Choir, Pat Crilly, Nuala & friends, Me, Your Man & the Clan, Cockney Barrer and the Shakti School of Carnatic Music. We were also treated to an impromptu Zimbabwean song from Mary and Margaret, sisters of contributor the late Hilda Chieza. Over 600 visitors enjoyed the live music, storytelling, food tasting and crafts as well as drinks from our international bar.





5.4 Online Engagement

Social Media:

Hertford Museum maintains a strong online presence with active social media accounts.

Our Twitter page is followed by 3732 people around the world whilst our 2389 Facebook followers tend to be more locally based, with women aged 34-44 having the greatest representation. Followers of our fledgling Instagram account increased by 26% this year to 385 and represent a greater proportion of people aged 18-34. We tweet and post about a wide variety of aspects of museum life, from events and exhibitions to new stock in our shop. Our most popular posts this year were in celebration of Holly R. Stephenson's 20 year anniversary of working at the museum.

6. Projects & Partnerships

6.1 Swift boxes

We worked with Hertford Swift Group to install six swift boxes on the museum office building. The boxes, installed around the town, were funded by a grant from East Herts District Councillor Ben Crystal.

Swift populations have decreased by over 50% in the last 20 years, so providing suitable places to nest is an important step in protecting these declining birds.



6.2 Hertford Is My Home

Phase II of this National Lottery Heritage Funded project included another physical exhibition and five more contributors, sharing their stories of arrival and making a home in Hertford. We are so grateful to all our contributors for sharing what, in some cases, were very difficult and moving experiences, including Vera Tytova's account of fleeing the war in Ukraine and the late Hilda Chieza, on making a new life following political exile from Zimbabwe. The online exhibition includes all the stories shared with us in both phases of the project and will remain on our website.

Our volunteers supported us throughout, transcribing hours of oral history recordings and facilitating our events. We also delivered oral history training, sharing our skills in recording and managing oral history collections.

We celebrated the project with a very special Hertford Is My Home Day in February 2023, featuring live performances of music from around the world, interactive storytelling, food tasting, crafts and an international bar (see Events 4.19 for more details).

The project was successful in meeting its aims of attracting new audiences, collating new stories of arrival and engendering pride in our community, as our survey results demonstrate:

- 76% rated the exhibition as excellent, with 24% rating it as good.
- 28% of exhibition visitors had never previously visited the museum.
- Asked if discovering the stories in the exhibition had given them a sense of pride in their local community, 47% agreed and 40% strongly agreed.
- 91% said they were now more likely to visit future exhibitions at Hertford Museum

6.3 Hertfordshire Regiment Website



In August, we received funding from the Army Museums Ogilby Trust towards the creation of a new website dedicated to the Hertfordshire Regiment. The funding covers approximately half of the cost of building the website and we will continue to need to fundraise for ongoing annual maintenance and hosting costs.

The website will tell the story of the Regiment (1908-1961) as well as explore its origins in the 1st Hertfordshire Rifle Volunteers and its descendant regiments. We will highlight the stories of individual servicemen and some of the extraordinary objects in our collections.

We continue to fundraise - £4757 raised this year — and the website will launch in Remembrance week 2023.

6.4 Roller Racking




Phase II of our archaeology stores roller racking project was finally completed in March 2023. We are indebted to the Friends of Hertford Museum for their efforts in fundraising towards this project, the origins of which date back over a decade when we first identified the need to ensure we could continue accepting archaeology depositions.

Thanks to the Friends and many other supporters, we have greatly increased our capacity in two of our store rooms and can continue to provide care and access to the archaeological heritage of East Herts for many years to come.

6.5 Museum Film

Our staff and volunteers worked with local videographer Paul Crowley, who created a film illustrating the wide scope of the museum's work. Paul generously donated his time and talent to making the film, attending multiple events to capture photographs and film footage and interviewing staff and volunteers. 7. Learning

A total of 4370 students at 50 schools engaged with our Learning Service this year. The number of students is down from last year's total of 5199 students at 48 schools, however, loan box hire, which saw a massive upturn in use during the pandemic at the cost of in person workshops, has reduced. Delivery of our in-person workshops increased by 47% from last year's figure.

7.1 Workshops for Schools

The new River Town workshop, launched in June was extremely popular. The workshop can only be delivered here during the summer term. It is not available as an outreach session as it centres around the

environment of Hartham and the Meads on the museum's doorstep.


Once again, our Nelly's Toy Box session was the most popular workshop, with Meet the Ancestors and Ancient Egypt coming in close behind.


Our Learning Officer, Vicky Smith, delivered 93 workshops this year to 2578 children from 31 schools, up 47% from last year's figure of 63 workshops and 1560 children.



8. Friends

The Friends of Hertford Museum fundraise throughout the year to support the museum in various projects. This might be assisting with funding an acquisition for the collection, conservation or the purchase of equipment. The Friends are renowned for their hugely popular annual quiz each March and summer garden parties.

This year, the Friends came to the rescue after a review of the IT provision at the museum. Our data storage equipment needed replacing and many staff and volunteers were using elderly donated machines. The Friends raised £5217 towards vital new equipment. This funding should help us maintain our IT provision for the next few years and has made a huge difference to the speed at which our staff and volunteers can work.

9. Patrons

Since the Patrons scheme was launched in 2001, the museum has seen a great deal of support from many individuals and their contributions have helped the museum in a variety of ways. The museum is always keen to enlist new patrons to the scheme to help us to continue to provide our services.

In return for a minimum donation of £150 a year, the patrons enjoy a number of privileges including the following:


